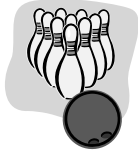

A great place for a picnic, a day of activities or an overnight stay in camping facilities or cabins. Miles of nature trails for hiking and biking follow the creeks and hills of this 696-acre park. A 26-acre lake for swimming, fishing and boating is available as well as tennis courts, playground, a beautiful waterfall, picnic areas and group camp area.

Donald E. Davis Arboretum

Located on the campus of Auburn University, the arboretum is home to 150 different tree species native to Alabama and the Southeast. A brochure distinguishes the species for visitors as they stroll along the walking trails.

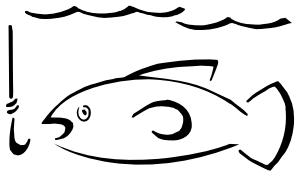
Hickory Dickory Park

The Depot

Built about 1920 and recently restored to its original style. Houses the offices of the Opelika Arts Association and Opelika Mainstreet.
